Campus Accountability Map + Tool School Selection Memo

END RAPE ON CAMPUS

There are over 6,000 accredited colleges and universities in the United States and its territories. End Rape On Campus' Centering the Margins framework focuses on and centers historically underserved and marginalized student survivors in the campus anti-rape movement and attends to the particular needs of those survivors. In accordance with this framework, particular focus was placed on including Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs), Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs), Rural Serving Institutions (RSIs), and Community Colleges in the first iteration of the Campus Accountability Map + Tool (CAMT). Detailed below is the inclusion criteria for the first 750 schools in the CAMT. Further additions to the CAMT data will be selected geographically and thematically, with more detailed description and justification to come. As of January 25th, 2023, the CAMT included:

- Largest Colleges & Universities: The two largest 4-year colleges and universities by combined undergraduate and graduate student enrollment as listed on collegestats.org in each state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the single largest university in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Any for-profit institutions were excluded from selection, as were any online-exclusive schools. Any schools that offer only associate's degrees (i.e. community colleges) were not included in the selection of two largest universities, even if they were larger by enrollment size than the 4-year institutions in their respective states. (Community colleges and other 2-year institutions are included in the CAMT, but were not considered for the largest two universities in the state). Also excluded were Harvard University and Dartmouth College, which are the second-largest nonprofit schools in Massachusetts and New Hampshire respectively, as they were already going to be included in the list of launch schools as Ivy League institutions. The nextlargest school in each of those states was included as the second largest. The selection was not limited to public schools; although this portion of the list is composed mostly of public schools, private schools were included if their enrollment size was large enough. Only one school was included for Wyoming, as there is only one four-year nonprofit, a non-online institution in that state (the University of Wyoming).
 - All eight Ivy League schools.
 - All fully accredited Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs).

- All currently open and accredited <u>Historically Black Colleges and Universities</u> (HBCUs).
- Over half (51%) of all Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs), member institutions of the <u>Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities</u>. There is overlap between these schools and the largest two schools in each state, as well as one school that is both an HBCU and a school on this list. No school is included twice in the CAMT.
- Many community colleges are included in the lists of TCUs, HBCUs, and HSIs.
 No additional community colleges were included at this time.
- Many Rural Serving Institutions (RSIs) are included in the lists of TCUs, HBCUs, and HSIs. No additional RSIs were included at this time.
- 100% of schools in Massachusetts, the District of Columbia, and Atlanta, Georgia.
- Professional schools such as cosmetology schools and medical assistant programs, K-12 schools, for-profit colleges, and any institutions that operate exclusively online were not included.

At the time that the Campus Accountability Map + Tool (CAMT) became publicly available (January 25th, 2023), it contained 764 schools. '

As of September 1st, 2023, the CAMT included all schools listed above, plus:

- The vast majority (89%) of all Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs), member institutions of the <u>Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities</u>.
- 100% of schools where a protest against sexual violence took place between May of 2021 and June of 2023. For more information on school protests compiled by the <u>Crowd Counting Consortium</u>, visit <u>End Rape On Campus'</u> <u>Action Center</u>.
- 100% of schools that were requested through our online priority request form. (This was a total of 75 schools between January-July of 2023).

 100% of schools in Idaho, Maine, Michigan, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Oregon, and Vermont.

As of September 1st, 2023, the Campus Accountability Map + Tool (CAMT) contained 1688 schools.
